Since 2008, Seabird College has provided Indigenous students the opportunity to pursue post-secondary education while staying connected to home, family, and culture. Our comprehensive support removes common barriers to education through free tuition, transportation assistance, childcare funding, daily meals, and cultural and mental wellness support.

Recent Successes and Achievements

Our diverse program offerings serve students from across the region, with recent celebrations highlighting the success of our approach:

Early Childhood Education & Business Administration

June

In June, we attended the graduation for our ECE and Business Administration programs. These programs prepare students to make meaningful changes in classrooms and communities. Cultural Education and Connections Specialist Zack Joe opened the ceremony with a traditional welcome that embodied our commitment to cultural integration. Graduates included a number of mature students and parents who balanced education with family responsibilities, showing great resilience and determination. Many are already employed in childcare centres or administrative roles in community organizations.

Community Support & Therapy Programs

We celebrated recent graduates from our Community Support Worker Diploma and Indigenous Focusing-Oriented Therapy programs, who are now equipped to serve their communities with culturally informed care. Several graduates have already secured positions with local health services.

Ashley Harris and Octavius Billy exemplify the impact of community-based education. Ashley recently completed her Education Assistant practicum, while Octavius continues working toward his Early Childhood Educator Diploma with Seabird's post-secondary funding support. Both made significant contributions during their practicums at Lalme' Iwesawtexw, helping in classrooms and supporting younger students. "Their time here was invaluable," noted Principal Steve Beier.

Another student, RaeAnne Charlie, completed the Trades Awareness Program and has now enrolled in the Welding Foundation program at UFV, inspired by her experience at Seabird College.

Graduate Spotlight: Yvonne Harry, Business Administration Certificate

"If you see an opportunity, take it." That's the advice from Yvonne Harry, who recently completed the Business Administration Certificate program. Inspired by her mother's entrepreneurial spirit, Yvonne enrolled to pursue her interest in bookkeeping and develop new skills. She shared that the program helped her grow both personally and professionally: "I feel more confident and informed now—I notice things in everyday life, whether I'm at work or just out shopping." Yvonne encourages others to go for it, even if balancing work and school feels overwhelming: "This has truly been one of the best decisions I've made."

Community Engagement

New Childcare Support Initiative Launching in August

To support student parents, Seabird College is launching a new childcare support initiative beginning this August. Eligible students will receive \$20 per day of class attendance to help with childcare costs. This benefit is available until the student's child turns 18 and is based on attendance. Students must provide a birth certificate to qualify. The \$20 is a daily maximum and does not increase with the number of children.

Trade Sampler Program Builds Career Foundations

April - June

Our Trade Sampler program launched on April 1 with 12 students—10 grade 12 students and 2 adult dogwood students—attending daily classes at UFV from 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM. This handson program provides university-level instruction in various trades while building comfort and confidence in a post-secondary environment.

Throughout April, students completed carpentry, plumbing, and electrical modules while earning first aid and CPR certification. The program continued with automotive, welding, culinary arts, and forklift certification components.

Students have expressed enthusiasm for the program, with many setting their sights on specific trades at UFV for fall enrollment. Instructor Jeremy, who has supported our students for three years, continues to provide exceptional guidance and encouragement.

FireSmart Education Promotes Community Safety

On April 9, Dan, Jacqueline, and Ember the FireSmart Fox visited our school to share important fire prevention and recognition knowledge with both elementary and high school students. The presentation emphasized being FireSmart at home and in the community while teaching essential prevention strategies.
